Unfortunately, someone broke into our trailer on or about Oct 18th, and stole much of our equipment. Thanks to one of our neighbors spotting someone suspicious in our area wearing one of ESSBW's t-shirts, the police were able to move as quickly. (Remember: "See something? Say something!")

With police aid, we were able to recover some equipment, but it was not in the best condition, and we were still missing a lot. Arrests have been made, but the equipment needed to be replaced as soon as possible. We had upcoming commitments where that equipment would be needed, like the G.A.I.N. event later in October.

Trees! Trees! Everywhere Trees!

Who doesn't love trees? They provide shade, block noise, light, and clean our air!



The City of Phoenix has recognized that more trees gets them closer to their goal to of providing 25% shade cover to mitigate heat by 2030. The focus has been on schools and neighborhoods with less tree canopy. APS is working with the City to meet these goals

and offered a \$10,000 grant for free trees. Thanks to the efforts of your neighborhood Block Watch, we qualified! (Another program from just the 4th Quarter.)

Our priority was Desert View Elementary school, one of the oldest and smallest schools in the Washington School District. The goal was to create a barrier between the school and the neighborhood, as well as blocking the light, air and noise pollution coming from 7th Street.

The secondary benefit of being able to get these desert adapted, low water usage trees, was to add a sound and light barrier protecting the neighborhoods on either side of 7th Street. These trees will help to create a quieter, less light filled night sky... in a few years.


Working with the great folks at **Whitfill Nursery** (824 E. Glendale), we were able to create a program where residents received a certificate, which they then took to Whitfill Nursery and used to choose one of six varieties of trees.



Each of these trees is being tracked and their condition will be reported on one-year from their planting.



However, years from now, when you note a cool breeze in summer, enjoy a walk through the neighborhood shade or realize the sirens and lights from 7th Street are not as loud or annoying, thank your local tree population... and APS!

- 4. Palo Verde
- 5. Mesquite
- 6. Desert Willow
